## A Letter to the Mayor HOPES FOR IMPROVEMENT TO PARKS

Following his visit to open the new Robertson Information Bay, a letter was sent to the Mayor, Cr. Yeo, thanking council for providing funding for this project. At the same time, it was suggested Council look at the question of parks in the village.

The point was made that a very high percentage of tourists (possibly as high as 70%) enter the Highlands through Robertson, but have to travel another 25 kilometers before they are exposed to a Council-groomed park or garden.

In this vacuum, such planting as does occur around the village is very much "ad hoc". It tends to be the work of a few enthusiastic individuals from time to time, rather than reflecting any coherent Council policy.

For instance, the bushland walk, to the north of Caalong Creek is potentially a great attraction for Robertson. But the path is irregularly mown, with the grass often too long and wet under foot for comfortable walking. Snakes are a potential hazard. The walk would be greatly enhanced by the provision of footpaths, by regular maintenance, and by co-ordinated planting of under-story shrubs.

It was also pointed out that the picnic facilities are highly inadequate, being just a few old tables crammed between the road and the playing fields. It would be a great improvement to have roofed shelters in a pleasantly landscaped area.

Apparently some land-scaping had been proposed around the new concrete slab but it is understood this was cancelled due to lack of funds.

Whilst the proposed new public toilets for the park are much appreciated, it was hoped that Council could review its parks and gardens policy to ensure that adequate funding is provided for the enhancement of the Robertson public landscape.

In closing, the letter stated that Robertson is in fact much more than the shire's Eastern gateway - no longer, if it ever was, a place visitors pass through to **get to** the Highlands but, these days, a major tourist destination **in** the Highlands.

A reply was received from the Mayor saying that "suggestions for Robertson's public landscape are noted and appreciated and will be considered during Parks and Property reviews. Due to changing situations, current mowing and maintenance schedules are being updated which should improve the levels of parks and reserves."

We will keep hoping!

## Garden Advice from Robertson Nursery

For winter colour it is best to plant advanced seedlings or potted colour. Smaller seedlings planted now will sit quietly waiting for spring before they will grow or flower. It is still not too late to plant tulip and hyacinth bulbs you may have forgotten to put in, and in fact any spring flowering bulb still unplanted is better planted now than left until next season.

In the vegetable garden, tidy, weed and compost in anticipation of spring plantings. Broad beans, English spinach and spring onion seed can be sown now. Broccoli seedlings can be planted as can Asian vegie mixed punnets to provide winter greens which will not quickly run to seed. It is a good time to lime vacant beds as this should not be done at the same time as you add fertilisers. Remember that all members of the Parsley family will do well during winter. These include coriander and celery leaf. Rocket, mizuna, leafy lettuce and endive will all flourish without bolting to seed also.

Winter is a good time to spend time in your orchard, even if it only comprises one tree! Trees should be well mulched to suppress weeds and any suckers from below the graft should be removed. Remove any remaining fruit and prune away dead or damaged wood. Winter is the most popular time for planting new fruit trees with the nursery receiving its entire range of new stock for the coming year. Remember many fruit trees such as apples, pears and plums need to be planted in pairs to allow cross pollination. The trees will only cross with certain pollinators, so if you have existing fruit trees in your garden try to make a note of the variety before coming in to buy other trees. If an existing tree is healthy and flowers but does not set fruit you are probably missing its pollinator.

Camellia sasanquas are still in flower and Camellia japonicas are budding up so now is the perfect time to come and see the amazing variety of colour and flower forms available these days. New season rhododendrons are now in stock and also budding up nicely. Both camellias and rhodos love our acidic soils and with the addition of some manure or other organic matter will provide a beautiful, flowering evergreen shrub to soften our bare winter gardens.

After all this rain, check for any spots in the garden where water is not able to drain away. Most plants will tolerate wet feet for a short time but long term water logging could mean trouble. Consider providing extra drainage or changing your plantings to cope with these conditions.

Enjoy winter in your garden. Some work now will ensure a picture perfect spring.

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## COOKERY CORNER APRICOT FUDGE CAKE

Soak ½ cup of apricots (shredded) for 2 hours.

Cream 120 g butter

180 g brown sugar

Add 2 eggs, beaten

60 g melted chocolate

1 tbsp apricot juice (strained from soaked apricots)

1 tsp vanilla

strained apricots

2 cups of S.R. flour sifted with

¼ tsp. carb soda

¾ cup of milk.

Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes

Ice with 2 tbsp of cocoa

remaining apricot juice

60 g of butter

(all heated)

mixed with 120 g of icing sugar.

Sprinkle with grated chocolate.

A good rich, moist cake, for special occasions.

## ROBERTSON'S WALL OF FAME

John Massetti, described as "Australia's leading autograph dealer", has a simple philosophy about the childhood passion that has become his lifelong career.

"I just love meeting famous people. I get a real buzz out of it. Getting the autograph is secondary, really it's just meeting the people," he says.

Sitting in the backroom of one of Robertson's most bustling new main street businesses, Essential Botanicals, run by his wife Sheila, John says he began autograph collecting as a child.

"It started when I was about ten and we lived in Christchurch, New Zealand. The only people who came to Christchurch were rugby and cricket players. My first famous autograph came from Colin Meads, who played for the All-Blacks in the 1960's."

John continued to collect autographs and had several brushes with fame in the 1970's when he lived in places such as Los Angeles and London. "I bumped into Ronnie Wood when I lived in LA, and then later in London found myself opening a lift door for Charlie Watts."

John pursued a career in the clothing industry, but continued to collect autographs as a hobby. That was until 1993, when he decided to develop his passion into a full-time career as an international dealer and collector.

Now John runs "Wall of Fame", a celebrity autograph business which sells signed memorabilia from a range of famous singers and actors including Barbra Streisand, Robert de Niro, Sir Anthony Hopkins, Elizabeth Taylor, and Jack Nicholson.

He also provides an authentication service, verifying whether autographs are genuine. Recently John was asked to check a photograph of the

Beatles with their names signed above each band member. To the owner, it appeared as though the signatures were original, but John was able to point out that they were in fact printed, and were therefore of no commercial value. He says disappointing people in this way is not something he enjoys!

A far more costly lesson for one Beatles fan came last year when John revealed that the fan had paid \$48,000 for forged Beatles signatures, bought at auction in Melbourne.

Among John's prized collections are a set of autographs from every Formula One World Champion since 1906, which took 12 years to compile, and costs \$45,000.

Another interesting commission that John was given recently, was from a political historian who wanted a complete set of autographs from every Australian Prime Minister since Federation. This cost \$35,000. Once this was done, the historian then asked John to repeat the exercise - only this time he wants the signatures on prime ministerial letterhead.

During the exercise of locating the original prime minister's signatures, John says many of the letters were historically fascinating, opening up a whole new branch of interest for him as a collector. John even has a whole collection of letters written between England and the Australian colonial administration during the 1890's and 1900's concerning the production of silver coinage in Australia.

"I really enjoy looking at these old documents. I'm learning about things I know nothing about - this is what I now get a kick out of," John says.
