The hall needs painting inside and out, the gutters need cleaning and the gardens could do with some TLC. The grass is mowed by a very helpful resident. The committee is in the process of doing the necessary work to try and build a new toilet block as the present toilets are very old. The hall is used as our local school hall and this would make a big

difference for all using the hall. To build the new toilets at least \$150000.00 will be needed.

If you are unable to help financially you may be prepared to help out with some of the other jobs that need to be done. Congratulations to Beaurepaire class who gained first prize for their class contributed artworks at the Robertson Show, based on the theme "The Farm". Beaurepaire all contributed chalk pastel sketches using blending techniques to create hens which made for a very colourful display and obviously caught the eye of the judges. Well done to our Year 6 students and Mrs Williams.

Last month, Year 6 students attended the Rotary Science Discovery Day at Mittagong RSL. Our students competed against 9 other schools, including public, private and independent schools. Students were given project based tasks including designing a chair that would hold a medium-sized dog, designing an earthquake tolerant skyscraper, powering a city with electricity in the most efficient way possible, building a hand that could grip objects, designing a bridge that was strong enough to withstand a certain amount of weights, developing a prototype hover board, developing a buggy that could carry



its load over uneven surfaces, and connecting towns with rail lines as efficiently as possible. Students had to use teamwork, strong communication skills and critical and creative thinking in order to complete the tasks well. We are very proud of our students who gained 3rd place overall on the day. Well done Year 6!

## A Night of Music for the Whole Family with special guest artist John Waters


On May 14th, kicking off at 7pm, the Robertson School of Arts will become a live music venue with the lights turned low and its floor strewn with attendees of all ages relaxing at long tables, kicked back on picnic rugs and cushions brought from home and dancing in front of the stage to an electro-acoustic mix of "Folk, Blues and Beyond".

It's a fundraiser - with proceeds from tickets, raffle and bar and beverage sales being split evenly between the School of Arts (SOA) and the Robertson Community Technology Centre (CTC@Robertson). The SOA, also functioning as the school hall for the Robertson public school, is in need of some upgrading to meet the demands of the future as a social hub for the Robertson community and the CTC relies on grants and fundraisers like this one to support its ongoing technology programs and other community activities.

Fourteen musicians are all donating their time for a good cause and will perform in four separate acts.



# A Waddle Down Hoddle


Starting in the East, everyone knows about the iconic **Robertson's Famous Pies** shop at the Jamberoo Road junction. A tourist hotspot (especially if you ride a motorcycle), this place serves what it says it does: pies! From fruit to meat, large family-sized to small, it's got them on offer every day of the week.

Next, we come to the newly refurbished and rather upscale **Robertson Hotel** with its understated, elegant bar occasional live jazz and - starting now - Friday and Saturday night fine dining in their grand, fireplace-warmed dining room. I haven't had the food yet but if they've put the same care into the menu that they have already put into the decor, it will be spectacular.

Though the **Cheese Factory Café** has gone through several incarnations since that first visit, it has found its footing again as a cafe with hearty and healthy fresh bistro-type food made on the premises daily, from morning to late afternoon, and it's only a short stroll through a passageway to a well-stocked cheese shop and gelato case with goodies for taking home for entertaining or out on picnics.

The next stop is the quirky, atmosphere-rich Rockabella's Roadside Diner with it's tequilahighlighted full bar, Tex-Mex/Classic American Diner options, and local favourite Thursday night \$3 gourmet soft and crispy tacos. Oh - and if you're eating gluten free - I've never seen a better selection of both sweet and savoury temptations in that category. Right next to that, the new kid on the block is **Petite Fleur Patisserie** - a real French bakery that makes quality gourmet pies, frittatas and classic pastries, among many other delights, using only real ingredients like butter and fruit. No wonder everything is so yummy! Open every day except Monday, with indoor and outdoor seating to enjoy your coffee and treat, it's already becoming legendary.

Now it's time to cross the street to **The Robertson Inn.** Not to be confused with the Robertson Hotel.



the Inn is also known as "the pub". But you're in for a surprise if you're expecting typical pub food. They've got that for sure but what earned it its place in the Sydney Good Food Guide is the delicious, upscale country inn fare they do an equally fine job of.

And just over the road from that, in a small but much loved commercial centre, you'll find **The Pirouette Cafe**. As I write this, anticipation is building around the recent sale and rumoured plans for expansion from a breakfast, lunch and coffee spot to a full restaurant with evening dining - and an organic fruit and veg shop. I'm told this Robertson icon's regulars won't be disappointed whatever changes come, as the former owner is still on the premises assuring their coffee gets made the way they like it!

A little further west, we come to **Chat's Cafe** in the new post office building. Still supplying the town with burgers and generous portions of fish and chips, it too has recently changed hands and now, in addition to the casual Aussie menu items, you can get real home-cooked Indian food by arrangement.

Heading out of Chat's, this time we take a sharp left turn to find, tucked away in the Robertson Bowling Club next to the railway station (you have to venture down a driveway or two to find it), the understated but wonderful **Mountain Spice**Thai. Open every day bar Tuesday for lunch and dinner, this three year-old gem is as popular for takeaway as it is for eat in family dining. Offering Asian and Indian, French and Aussie classics all made with fresh, locally-sourced ingredients, you can circle the globe in one sitting and drinks from the Bowlo bar are the best deal in town.

Back out on the main street, and only a block further down Hoddle, it's **Pizzas In The Mist** on the corner of Caalong. You can't miss its warm red trim and inviting facade, the smell of woodfired pizzas - or the crowds of happy diners at white-clothed candle-lit tables in the evenings Wednesday through Saturday. People come from all over the Highlands to eat in and takeaway what many declare to be the best pizza anywhere while its gourmet menu keeps it busy with special celebrations and romantic dinners for two.

Finally, and last but not least, in the far west of Hoddle, right before the servo, is the **Southern Rise Bakery**. Handing freshly baked hot pies, quiches and coffee over the counter to a loyal following of commuters from the very early morning and supplying the sweet tooth of locals throughout the day with cakes, donuts and Aussie classics like lamingtons, this bakery is much more than an afterschool bread stop!

I'm still not exactly sure what it is about this 1500 person town that has attracted such a variety of talented chefs. Maybe it's the artistic vibe. All I know is I'm proud of the quality and diversity we have to offer.

Now all we need...is a gym!

# Take your Trolley down Hoddle

This time, grab your shopping trolley and set off down the main street for fresh food supplies. This time let's start at the western end of Hoddle Street.

The new owners of **Robertson Recollections** also have a **coffee** roasting business— pick up some fresh beans here.

Cross the street and head up to the **Robertson** 



**Butcher** in the Robertson Shopping Village for fresh **meat** supplies as well as roast chickens, **fresh eggs** and salads. Daryl is renowned for his gourmet meats including his regular new sausage varieties! Daryl and Karen are also providing a fresh **fruit and vegetable** service now with twice a week deliveries of pre-ordered fruit and veg boxes from Highlands Fresh in Mittagong.

Speaking of **fruit and vegetables**, another option is the home deliveries available from **Moonacres** organic farm. Or if you have a surplus of home grown produce or something else to swap, there is the **Crop Swap** every Saturday from 9am-10am outside Rockabellas.

Further along Hoddle Street on the northern side, the next stop is the Robertson Supermarket, **The Friendly Grocer**. Here you will find Robertson **Potatoes**, meat from **Maugers Meats** who have been selling home grown beef and lamb from their farms at Robertson for over 44years. Neil and Heather also offer fresh fruit and vegetables and of course a selection of **wine** to have with your home made dinner plus all the other regular grocery items. Looking for fresh **bread on a Sunday**? This is also available at the Supermarket and from the **Petite Fleur Patisserie** (and from the **Sunrise Bakery** every other day of the week!).

Outside the Supermarket on Thursdays and Friday afternoons and Saturday mornings our local fishmonger, Lars and Yvette of **Arwon Seafoods**, sell **fresh seafood**.

The final stop is the Cheese Factory which is open every day providing a large variety of local and imported **cheese**. You can also pick up some **organic gelato** for dessert.

Not available in the Robertson shops (I don't believe) but a part of the local fresh food scene is Robertson truffle grower **Yelverton Truffles** who grew the largest truffle ever grown in Australia in 2014.

## Robertson is next in the Southern Highlands Food and Wine Clusters project

An exciting new project is being rolled out across the region called the Southern Highlands Food and Wine Clusters. This is a "ground up" initiative, supported by the Moss Vale and Rural Chamber and brain child of Vice Chair, Brigid Kennedy who has The Loch at Berrima.

This project is a great example of people working together to support each other for mutual benefit. The Loch in Berrima grows vegetables during the week and is open for farm gate sales on Sunday from 10 - 4. This is just a sample of the many wonderful farm gates on offer. Brigid's experience in collaboration in Walsh Bay as Chair of their Chamber of Commerce showed her how good business with co-branding and marketing can be in a region if everyone in "like businesses" works together. So geographical clusters are being formed to encourage visitors to look at other businesses in an immediate location.

Nine such areas or "clusters" are planned in the area, where the tourist and locals alike can explore what the Southern Highlands has to offer. Meeting the farmer on his or her land raises awareness and knowledge of where your food and wine comes from.

Brigid approached Jill Dyson formally of FoodPath Culinary Tours. Jill had run food and farm tours in the Highlands for 5 years so knew all the local food producers. Prior to that Jill ran Slow Food Southern Highlands with her partner Nick Padol for several years. When the data bases were developed more than 100 food businesses were identified. This number has now grown to 130.

just the Joadja and Moss Vale areas have been showcased with the other rural areas to be developed during the year. Clusters for the towns will follow next year. Joadja Cluster opened on 16 Oct 2015 as our pilot; and 16 March 2016 saw the launch of the Moss Vale Cluster with Larry Whipper, Mayor of Wingecarribee, cutting the ribbon.

### Robertson is next on the list!

As well as showcasing what is best in the Highlands in the food and wine scene by forming them into Clusters, a great sense of community has evolved between the Cluster members as they collaborate with each other and cross promote. This increases awareness of what is amazing about their particular part of the Southern Highlands.

The benefits to the area as a whole are that visitors will have a good reason to come back again and again - exploring a different cluster each time. While still enjoying their favorites of course. We will be starting work on the Robertson Cluster in the next few months with an opening at the end of winter. So watch this space!

Do you love the environment and don't like methane messing it up? Do you love your cattle and sheep, wish they didn't produce so much **and** grew faster? **More meat**, **milk and wool – less methane** 

Professor John Black will talk about the exciting outcomes – and that's just so far – of the National Livestock Methane Program. It aims to reduce methane emissions while increasing productivity of Australia's livestock. Methane, animal productivity and environmental sustainability are very closely linked. Scientists have identified a range of treatments – supplements, forages, genetics – which producers can use to lower methane emissions and increase productivity. He will reveal a lot more in his talk and in answer to your questions!

**Annual Wool Festival 2 April** All things wooly will come to Robertson on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2016 when the annual Wool Festival organised by the Black and Coloured Sheep Breeders Association will be held. It showcases the produce of local growers who offer for sale fleeces of varying colours and types suitable for spinning, weaving and felting. Sheep naturally come in a range of colours (browns, blacks and silvers) and depending on the breed can be used in different craft projects. Fine merinos, medium corridales or cross breds for soft garments and stronger border leicesters or lincolns for rugs or sturdier outer garments. All of these will be on display with growers and spinners available to give advice to beginners. ## Neil Lawrence's film Ka-Ching! Pokie Nation - CTC Saturday 30th April 7pm

A documentary made by the late, legendary and much-loved ad man Neil Lawrence is to have a special screening at the CTC. Neil introduced his first film To Spring From The Hand at the CTC in 2014, and he was very much looking forward to screening his latest film *Ka-Ching! Pokie Nation* in Robertson again. Tragically Neil died in a diving accident in the Maldives shortly before the film was to be premiered in Sydney in 2015. The film will show industry insiders explaining how

designers engineer these machines to merge complex algorithms with flashing lights and musical cues to keep people inexorably coming back to the bandit. Their success is such that 'pokies' are now listed alongside life-wrecking narcotics such as cocaine and heroin in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, the reference book for psychiatrists.

Co-producer Mitzi Goldman saw the power of the story being told, and spoke on Lawrence's

passion for his subject. "Neil drove this piece and I worked alongside him, navigating the "human highway" to use one his favourite phrases. And it has been a busy, fast and at times dangerous highway. "Neil's untimely and sudden death has shocked and saddened us all. It has been an honour to create this film with him, his last work and a passion piece," said Goldman. The screening of *Ka-Ching! Pokie Nation* will be held at the CTC on April 30th at 7pm. Neil's wife Caroline and the film's producer Mitzi Goldman and editor Andrea Lang will be at the screening and answer questions about the making of the film.

## New Information Centre planned for Robertson

During 2015 Wingecarribee Shire Council conducted a series of meetings with Robertson residents to discuss what they might want in "Our Village - Our Future". From these meetings a plan was put together and since then, with the help of the Robertson Shed Inc. (the Management organisation for CTC@Robertson) much action is under way to achieve some of the planned objectives.

The first activity centres on building community spirit and involvement in the village and attracting more tourists to Robertson. To achieve this there will be a community information centre located in the centre of Robertson and using visual and computer based technology, it will display what's on in the community and what attractions Robertson has to offer. These attractions will be built around the geography, geology, history (e.g. the dairy factory), nineteenth century architecture (e.g the Robertson Pub) and unique rural ventures (e.g the truffle farm) of our village. The planned location for this Community Information Centre (CIC) is along the main street somewhere between where the current sign in as the CTC. This is because it is the centre of the village and has nearby toilets, Hampden Park attractions, the Heritage Railway and parking.

The objective is to have a structure of architectural merit that residents can be proud of – so expressions of interest are being called for from artists, architects and designers for the project. Because of the wealth of talent in and around Robertson and the desire for local ownership preference will be given to those who live in the

The expression of interest is designed to attract submissions from which a short list of 3 will be

chosen. Each finalist will be give \$1,000 to produce their final design and the winner will be chosen from these. Expressions of interest close at midnight on Monday 4 April. There is a sub-committee of the Robertson Shed Inc. managing the community project and the process. With the assistance of two qualified people it will choose the three finalists. The eventual winner will be



The project management group consists of the CTC President Jenny Kena, and local residents Don Dyer, Neil Harvey, Ian Wallace, Steve Chowdhury and Peter Glass. They have set themselves the task of raising \$50,000 plus much in-kind support for the Community Information Centre. Wingecarribee Shire Council has been very supportive and has contributed \$20,000 toward this "Our Village – Our Future" flagship project. Expect to see the selected designer around mid year.
