Ever find yourself standing at the cash register, watching your purchases get rung up, feeling guilty because you've left your environmentally-friendly reusable shopping bags in the boot (or back home), yet again?

A group of volunteers called the Robertson Village Bag Ladies have been hard at work on a solution that will make that experience a thing of the past for those that want it to be.

Robertson Bag Swap will soon provide cloth bags to all the shops in Robertson so that every time you shop you can choose to have your goods popped into them instead of plastic - free of charge! To return the bag and get it back into circulation, simply drop off the empty bag at any shop - including the Post Office - next time you're in the village. Of course, if remembering to bring a bag shopping isn't the challenge for you that it is for me, the group welcomes you to keep any bags you can reuse. Bags in circulation that need repairing can be simply returned at any time.

The bags are made from donated fabric scraps and come in a variety of shapes and sizes - all sporting the same beautiful hand-printed logo. Christine

What is a Men's Shed?*

Men's sheds are a community-based, noncommercial organisation that address social inclusion, participation and community building for men. The modern Men's Shed is an updated version of the old shed in the backyard that has long been a part of Australian culture.

If you visit a Men's Shed you may see a number of men restoring furniture or bicycles for a local school, younger people working with the older men learning new skills, tea-bags, coffee cups and a comfortable area where men can sit and talk. You might see an area where men can learn to cook healthy low cost meals or see crafts such as woodturning or metalwork or machinery being repaired.

Members of Men's Sheds come from all walks of

life - what unites them is that they are men with time on their hands who would like to do something useful. Men's Sheds have a safe and happy environment where men are welcome to work on a project of their choice in their own time in a spirit of mateship.

Also, becoming a member of a Men's Shed gives a man a safe and friendly environment where he can find many things to do in an atmosphere of old-fashioned mateship. And,

Literacy & Numeracy Programs achieving great results at Robertson Public School

Supporting individual students to achieve literacy and numeracy goals focused on helping students to "close gaps" in their learning has, at Robertson Public School in 2016, seen the implementation of two very successful programs implemented by a committed and dedicated team of volunteers.

Research shows that the most effective programs for reading instruction incorporate three key elements: phonics, sight word recognition and supported reading. The Learning Support Team at Robertson Public School drew on a range of strategies from evidence based practices to put together the learning program for Literacy and then trained tutors to deliver this program to students.

The Numeracy program utilises identified key skills and understandings students need in Years 3 and 4 to ensure they consolidate place value concepts, non-count-by-one strategies for addition and subtraction, and strategies for developing the fundamentals in multiplication and division.

The Literacy program involves an intensive 20 minute session three times per week where students are supported in achieving increased sight word recognition, increased accuracy when reading, improved reading fluency and comprehension.

The Numeracy program involves an intensive 20 minute session three times per week where students are supported in achieving efficient strategies for addition and subtraction, place value skills and concepts and strategies for consolidating multiplication and division.

A Learning Support teacher oversees the implementation and supports tutors in their role, communicates progress to parents and staff, and ensures weekly resourcing.

The program has had so much success that the school hopes to provide an on-going program in 2017. The school welcomes any community members who would like to become a volunteer tutor. If interested, please contact the principal, Susan Matthews at Robertson Public School on 48851284.

Just lately, "The Swimming Club" had taken to climbing higher into the tree, and doing what I believe is called "bombing" into the water. This has had me very worried as I felt it was too dangerous and I asked them not to do it. I have been wondering how I could "police" this behaviour when providence came to the rescue. We had two days of torrential rain, and when I looked next out of my window, the childrens' fun tree had been uprooted and had fallen across the creek. I awaited the next arrival of the Robertson Swimming Club with more than a little interest.

There was an awed silence when they came next for a Tarzan adventure. They quietly studied the tree, marveled at the size of it roots now ungainly mid air, and attempted walking its trunk like a tightrope across Niagra. All was very quiet. A little later I noticed something else, the children had planted a cross for the tree, and today I noticed it is surrounded with flowers.

I am sorry kids, that you have lost your tree, I know I nagged you about the noise and language but I was always actually pleased to see you enjoying yourselves. Soon hopefully the Robertson Swimming Pool will be ready for you. I hope you have just as much fun there, and that you take care of yourselves and keep safe.

Unfortunately we have seen more people being targets of scams recently. An "Alert" message appears sometimes accompanied by an alarm sound. The message states there is some problem with your computer and gives a toll free number to call. Usually they say they are from Microsoft but we have also come across some claiming to be from well known antivirus companies. They are all scams, do not call the number. Turn off the computer and seek advice from your computer technician or come into the CTC, we may be able to assist or we can put you in touch with a reliable computer technician.

The CTC is running 3 more funded courses, 2 of which specifically look at security and privacy issues. First an overview of some of the problems and what you can do to prevent them, it does involve more than just having an antivirus program. The second looks at Facebook, this is a great way to keep in touch with your family, friends and local community as well as support groups. We will look at how to keep control of who can see your information. The third workshop is an introduction to iPads and tablets, we have some for you to look at and discuss differences, accounts and downloading apps. These classes have been funded by Community Underwriting so we can offer them for just the cost of a gold coin. Please call to book, 4885 2665.

The assembly included choir and band performances from past and present music students and the unveiling of new signage for the Music Room in honour of Cheryl Ricketts.

Andrew Ford has dedicated a new piece to the memory of Cheryl Ricketts. Commissioned by the National Carillon in Canberra, *Lin-lan-lone* will have its first performance by senior carillonist Lyn Fuller during the Canberra International Music Festival on Friday 5 May, with more performances on 6th and 7th.

Andrew said: 'Cheryl started so many local people on their musical journeys, that I thought it would be nice to have a piece with her name on it ringing out from time to time across Lake Burley-Griffin. The title comes from "Far-far-away", a late poem by Tennyson, with its reference to the "mellow lin-lan-lone of evening bells", and I imagined what it would be like to hear the piece from the far side of the lake.'

Lin-lan-lone won't only be heard in Canberra. It will also be played by Siang Ching Ngu on the Sydney University Carillon on 28 May, and in July it will be heard at the World Carillon Congress in Barcelona.

Local Gorilla Girl Wins Youth Citizen Award

On Australia Day, Zoe Brain from Wildes Meadow, was awarded the Wingecaribee Shire Council's Youth Citizen of the Year for 2017. Zoe who is 13 years old, has demonstrated strong leadership skills and selflessness over the last several years, by giving many hundreds of hours to the community, from fundraising with Burrawang's Primary School and Australia's Biggest Morning Tea, to creating an Australian first, the 'Gorilla Girlz'. A team of young, passionate and motivated students nationally, who are raising money to save critically endangered gorillas.

To date, the Gorilla Girlz have introduced mobile phone recycling programs into 18 local, NSW, Queensland and Victorian schools and local businesses. She was voted one of 2016's top stories on the ABC's 'Behind the News' TV program. Zoe runs a two-hour weekly radio program on 92.5 Youth FM, regularly inviting quests, to raise environmental awareness, as well


