

Swimming Pool Update

Robertson and District Swimming Pool Association (RADSPA) Progress Report 7 March 2021

The RADSPA committee held an information session for financial members on Sunday 7th March at the Robertson Bowling Club. In the previous week all members had been notified of the meeting by email. Many members attended and also participated in a Q&A.

The current committee was voted in 15 weeks ago on 15th December 2020.

Work has focused on the insurance claim and writing a grant application. The committee has pursued all documentation for an insurance claim of professional negligence and this matter is now in the hands of lawyers. After the insurance claim is settled, RADSPA's financial position will be stronger than when the first build was initiated.

A grant application has been made under the Bushfire Recovery Scheme for funds to build the Robertson Multipurpose Sports Hall and Pool. The **primary** use of this proposed building is as an emergency shelter in the event of natural disasters in the region.

The building would be durable, low maintenance, with a solar array and heat pumps for the pool. It would have a commercial kitchen, cafe, gym and a hall which can be used as an indoor hockey court or soccer field or basketball court and many other sports and functions. The hall, kitchen and amenities are designed to accommodate 300 people in an emergency.

Robertson is ideally placed for an emergency shelter. Robertson's combination of high rainfall, low bushfire threat, close proximity to coastal urban areas and larger towns of the Southern Highlands makes it an ideal location for this purpose.

If the grant application is successful, the building must be completed within two years and employ local tradespeople as far as practical.

This concept is important for the development for our region. If residents wish to assist they could write to Wendy Tuckerman to express their support for the project.

And to help you enjoy some of Robertson's dining experiences, many of our cafes and restaurants are accepting **Dine and Discover** vouchers. This NSW Government initiative is designed to give hospitality venues a boost after the effects of COVID 19.

Everyone in NSW who is 18 years and over can apply for two \$25 Dine vouchers and two \$25 Discover vouchers. Dine vouchers can be used for dining in at restaurants, cafes, clubs and bars 7 days a week. Discover vouchers can be used for entertainment and recreation.

At the time of going to press, the following Robertson businesses were registered to accept the vouchers— Robertson Pie Shop, Robertson Public House & Kitchen, Three Spuds Bistro at Robertson Bowling Club, Siam Mist, the Robertson Hotel, Pizzas in the Mist—but more businesses are being added all the time so check the Dine and Discover website for participating businesses. You can search by postcode

or location name (Hint: don't forget to select *suburbs* or postcodes containing when searching under suburb or postcode, not business name containing.)

To get the vouchers, you can apply online and print them out or display them on your phone. You will need a MyService NSW account. (If you need a hand with this, the volunteers at CTC Robertson can help.) If you don't have a MyService NSW account or you are unable to apply online you can call 137788 or go the Service NSW office in Mittagong.

Easter at Robbo Anglican By Graham Thomas, Minister, Robertson/Burrawang Anglican Church





A Story About Lyndy

"When I was four years old I had been lost for some time. My dairy farmer father was relieved when he found me, along with the two blue heeler farm dogs. I had one in each hand held by the ear. I told my father, 'You can come and ask me when you need them'. I identify very, very strongly with vets and animals in general and I always will". That is Lyndy.

Lyndy Scott grew up near Perth in Western Australia. When she left school she went bush. She spent several years in outback northern Australia. She has many captivating stories about living and working in one of the remotest regions of the world.

"This experience in the outback reinforced her passion and great empathy for all living creatures,

which inspired her to undertake a degree in veterinary science at Murdoch University" says Professor John Black who has known Lyndy and

worked with her for many years. Murdoch University was just forming its Veterinary School and lecturers came from South Australia in those early years.

After graduating Lyndy worked in a mixed animal practice - tough work, mostly with horses in the Swan Valley.

Lyndy spent several years as the veterinarian in Hay in southern NSW, where she was loved by the farmers and was involved in most community activities. After this period as a veterinary practitioner, Lyndy concentrated her efforts on how best to improve the health and welfare of animals and continue her connection with horses.

Stories of people and horses go back a long way. Humankind has been domesticating horses for three or four thousand years. People relied on horses for food, milk, transport, hunting and fighting. The bond with horses is one of the closest bonds between people and animals. Children's books like *My Friend Flicker* or *Thunderhead* formed many a child's love of horses.

But an adult understanding of horses takes time and probably has more in common with learning an Asian martial art than being bossy or having to be in total control.

Lyndy wanted to work more with production animals and went to Queensland, dealing with sheep, as well as horses.

Next she became the first female vet in the new Animal Protection section of the Rural Lands Department based in Hay. This involved teaching some fairly machismo farmers how to do a hands on examination of the working parts of a bull. She had to point out to those coyly averting their gaze while she was demonstrating, "You're not going to learn much if you're not watching".

In February this year, the Robertson Burrow Community Op Shop launched their Community Grants Program. The first round closed on 29 March with the results to be announced soon.

The Robertson Burrow Community Op Shop is a not -for-profit, community-owned and volunteer-run organisation. Its goal is to reduce landfill by giving goods a second life; recycling, reusing, and repurposing where possible. Profits are redistributed (by grant application) back into community programs and projects in the village of Robertson and its immediate neighbouring localities.

There will be up to 6 grants available each quarter for amounts valued at a minimum of \$500 and a maximum of \$1000. Grant funding will be awarded at the beginning of each quarter. Applications close the last Monday of the quarter and grants will be awarded to successful applicants within the first week of the following month. When she turned up on one farm the farmer announced "I'm waiting for the vet". He reddened as Lyndy announced "I am the vet". He responded that he did not see lady vets to which Lyndy replied, "Well it is a good thing I came to see the horse. And you can help me." "We worked together. Eventually he invited me to lunch." says Lyndy.

She spent periods as Senior Program Manager for disease and welfare research at the Pig Research and Development Corporation and Program Director for welfare at Animal Health Australia.

During this time, she was instrumental in developing quality and welfare standards for Australian pig farmers and abattoirs. Lyndy then spent years as a consultant inspecting welfare conditions and meat safety at many abattoirs across locations in Western Australia, NSW and Victoria.

Lyndy has been active in the RSPCA and, among many other achievements, helped to bring about changes in government legislation banning the use of animals in cosmetic testing and banning the whip in harness racing. Lyndy loves animals and people.

She chose to live in Robertson from seeing it from the air in her many trips between Canberra and Sydney. She also chose it as a relief from the heat of Western Australian summers.

Lyndy was a foundation member of the Age Friendly Robertson group formed to develop the community appreciation and respect for all ages. And has been a friend to locals as they grow old at home.

Exciting News From Robertson Heritage Railway Station—the Return of The Cockatoo Run!

Local community group Robertson Heritage Railway Station was very pleased to receive the news from train operator East Coast Heritage Rail that the iconic heritage tourist train, *'The Cockatoo Run'* will resume visiting Robertson and Moss Vale on Saturday, 24th and Sunday, 25th April 2021.

It is expected that the train will again be operated by a heritage diesel-electric locomotive hauling five passenger cars from Sydney to Robertson and Moss Vale, and return to Sydney. Details about Covid-safe travel are yet to be finalised. Intending passengers should visit the East Coast Heritage Rail website

After a lull of many months, during which heritage train travel was severely restricted or not available at all, the Robertson Heritage Railway Station website www.robertsonrailway.org.au is still up and running but is gradually being updated and simplified. Watch this space for further information during 2021.

Following receipt of a grant from the Federal Government's 'Stronger Communities Program' to partly fund several information signs at Robertson Heritage Railway Station, three signs designed by local identity Peter Campbell have been produced and will be erected as soon as possible. These will focus on a variety of aspects relating to the Unanderra – Moss Vale railway line and to Robertson station in particular. Details relating to the opening date for the signs will be announced shortly.







Kangaloon Students at State Championships

William finished 1st in Discus, 1st in Long Jump, 1st in High Jump and 2nd in 70m sprint. This qualified them to go to Sydney Olympic Park on 20th and 21st March for the State Championships.

There were a lot of kids injured from slipping over doing High Jump, Hurdles and even just running on the straight track. William came 6th in High Jump, 18th in Discus and 20th in 70m sprint and 18th in Long Jump. Lucy came 6th in Discus and 17th in Shot Put.

What a great effort from both of them to make it to the State Championships—well done to Lucy and William!
