YoungREPS needs community support to make their dream of expanding the critically endangered Rainforest a reality. How? The backyards and



acreages in Robbo are full of "Micro Rainforest Remnants" Single trees or a few clumped together that often have little seedings and seeds under them. These are precious and are the future of the forest expansion. Even those weedy

pittosporums are a great start to transforming a paddock into a micro rainforest. If you can help by supplying seedlings (under 30 cm) to YoungREPS that would be an amazing contribution to the future of the area and our children.

YOU don't need to do much at all. If you have a seedlings or a tree seeding contact reps@reps.org.au. If you have seedlings they don't need potting up. An authorised plant collector will be in touch to let you know the next steps for collection. Blackwood trees are seeding at the moment, Pinkwood seedpods will be popping open soon and let us know when your Lilly Pilly is fruiting. Graham has been with Greening Australia for the



past 16 years designing and delivering revegetation projects across a range of public and private land. These projects have ranged from small scale enhancement plantings to those several hundred

hectares in size. He was heavily involved in the Whole of Paddock Rehabilitation (WOPR) program

which combined environmental and agricultural production goals in grazing operations. For the last 3 years Graham has been working with landholders across NSW to help them access the Australian carbon market. He will discuss the opportunities through carbon offsets for landholders to accelerate their farm plans, to generate their own carbon credits, to provide habitat for wildlife, or to secure an additional source of income from planting native trees and shrubs.

Update from Robertson RFS

The past summer has been wetter than expected and you've probably noticed how much your grass likes these conditions. There's lots of long grass around in the district, in yards, paddocks and roadsides. Whilst it is green now it doesn't take many days of warm, dry,



windy conditions or frost to dry it off and make it a fire risk. So please cut or slash your grass regularly even as we come into cooler weather. The leaves are starting to fall in Robertson so please continue to clean up around your property, keeping

gutters and drains clear to reduce the risk of fires impacting your house.

We are expecting to see a number of hazard reduction burns across the region during Autumn. The burns will take place as favourable weather conditions allow. The burns are planned using the medium term weather forecasts but can change date at short notice as a clearer picture of conditions allows.

These burns reduce fuel loads, lessening the intensity of a bush fire should they occur, and enhance the protection of homes against bush fires. We may see smoke from burns in the Highlands or Sydney. Residents in smokeaffected areas should minimise outdoor activities, secure doors and windows, shelter pets, and, when driving, exercise caution by slowing down and using headlights.



Those with respiratory or heart conditions, especially asthmatics, are advised to take necessary precautions, follow treatment plans, and keep medications readily available.

Please remember while you may see and smell smoke from hazard reduction burning, only call Triple Zero (000) if you see a fire without a fire truck present. You can also check the Hazards Near Me app to see whether smoke is from something nearby that emergency services are already aware of.

Maybe that bit of land could be used for....

The Op Shop is the latest in a line of community organisations who have made enquiries and representations in regard to using the block of land between the CTC and AgriWest for community purposes. It is said to have originally been the Police horse paddock.

As is widely known, the Robertson Burrow Community Op Shop is looking for a new home as the site it is currently on is being developed. The Robertson Community Association recently made representations to Council to see if it could help with gaining access to this empty block to accommodate a temporary structure for the Op Shop. Council contacted our local member Wendy Tuckerman who raised the issue with Steve Kamper MP, Minister for Lands and Property. This response from the Minister to Ms Tuckerman was provided to the Community Association.



Thank you for your correspondence of 23 October 2023, on behalf of Wingecarribee Shire Council (Council), regarding the use of Crown land at 56 Hoddle Street1, Robertson (Lot 12 Section 18 DP 758882), the former site of NSW Police. I appreciate the reasons that prompted you to write and note Council's intention to install temporary structures on the site for use as an Op shop.

I am advised that the Department of Planning and Environment – Crown Lands' (the Department) position has not changed, since your last representation in 2022, despite Council's revised proposal to use temporary structures instead of erecting a new building.

The site is reserved for 'Police Purposes' and the proposed use is inconsistent with the reserve purpose and NSW Police has not changed its previous position of not wanting to relinquish its interest in the land. Furthermore, the land is still subject to two undetermined Aboriginal land claims, and native title interests under the *Native Title Act 1993* (Cth) apply.

Even if the above issues were able to be addressed, access to the land would need to be consistent with the Department's direct negotiation policy on the sale, lease or license of Crown land.

The Department has also considered the possibility of a licence, however, a short-term licence is not suitable as these licences are granted for purposes that are less than 12 months. Unfortunately, the installation of temporary structures for an Op shop is inconsistent with the purposes for which a short-term licence can be considered.

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
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New Faces at Robertson Pharmacy

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All About Wiltipolls Shedding Sheep

Sheep and cattle are ideally suited to graze sequentially on the same pasture, as they prefer different feedstocks.



Cattle graze longer grass, while sheep prefer shorter grass, and may graze pasture down to a neat lawn. Running a mob of sheep behind a herd of cattle will get the maximum

productivity out of the land and is recommended practice for regenerative agriculture.

Grazing two sets of animals can increase the workload, so the choice of sheep breed is critical to minimise extra tasks. Shedding sheep reduce the workload (no crutching, mulesing, or shearing, and usually no need to treat for external parasites). Wiltipolls are known for clean complete shedding (not all shedding sheep lose all their wool). Most shedding sheep breeds are best suited to dry conditions, whereas Wiltipolls, being bred out of English breeds, can cope well with wet conditions, though they are also tolerant of drought and do well on poorer pastures.

Some advantages of Wiltipolls:

Easy care, hardy; Excellent quality meat, high carcass to live weight ratio; Friendly disposition, gentle on fences; Good mothers, multiple births common; Quality stud stock available at reasonable prices.

Geoff and Nikki, of Pine Hill Wiltipoll Stud, are based in Robertson. They took two eighteen month-old rams to the Robertson Show, and visitors were impressed with the clean shedding, calm temperament, and size of their animals. The Spirit of Robertson

It began with an idea I had in 2022 and took to the CTC, to help Robertson residents write stories about our hometown through a series of writing workshops I'd lead, and to collect the resulting writing into an archive of local history. That first attempt didn't get off the ground when our initial grant application wasn't successful. Fast forward a year later to 2023 and our second attempt at a grant WAS successful, thanks to the belief of the

Southern Highlands Community
Foundation in the project. Time had
matured the idea a little more, so that
the project now also emphasised the
development of creative writing skills in
the participants. So, after a hurried call
out, after which we nervously waited on
registrations, wildly hoping we might get
15 or 20 and secretly thinking, well, just
getting a couple would be a start, we
ended up with a cohort of 12
participants. By the time we got to the
first class in late October, that number
had dropped to 10 and, given the nature
of the workshops which involved quite
intense work with each participant, this e

intense work with each participant, this ended up being the perfect number.

We had three terrific guest speakers in writers Kylie Needham, Jackie Bailey and Nigel Featherstone and we read some classic and contemporary writing from other writers (Capote, Chekov etc.), to learn about technique such as character, setting and point of view. All participants consistently wrote through the whole six-week program, received feedback from me as the workshop leader and from each other as colleagues — it was incredible to see the writing improve each week. That initial idea of creating a local archive of stories and history also changed as participants brough their own personalities and ambitions to the workshop. They wrote stories about their homeland and people they

knew there, or about reconnecting with their ancestral roots; they wrote about their childhoods, about family history; they wrote fiction inspired by Robertson settings and they wrote about how they first came to town. In the end, my personal discovery was that telling stories about Robertson wasn't about how farming first arrived or how the early colonists changed the landscape or how the Big Potato got built. Stories are personal things and writing is, in part, an act of confession telling us something about the writer. The collection of stories we ended up with was true to the spirit of Robertson because the people writing them lived here and the concerns and backgrounds in their stories reflected the makeup of the town as we know it now.


