Update from Robertson & District Aquatic Centre

RADSPA Chair, Neville Fredericks shared this update on the Robertson and District Aquatic Centre Facebook page on 7 July.

"This week our committee received advice that we were unsuccessful with our application for a grant from the NSW Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund. Our application was for an emergency refuge

and multi-purpose indoor sports centre. The total grant fund available was \$250 million and applications totalled \$1,600 million. Appreciation is expressed to Mark Jones of Edmiston Jones Architects who assisted our committee with project cost estimates for the application.

The outcome of our committee's intense efforts over the holiday period to develop the project concept and lodge the application remains positive. We now have a more suitable site available and a plan for a multi-purpose complex that if funded would serve a wide range of indoor recreational needs of Robertson and district residents.

Our committee's view is that by making the proposed building an emergency accommodation centre, the prospects of attracting grant funding would be enhanced. Furthermore, the operational viability of the proposed centre would be significantly improved with a wider range of uses compared to a stand-alone swimming pool.

Our committee intends to engage with the Dept. of Regional NSW (DRNSW) for a feedback session and to gain a better understanding of upcoming grant opportunities. In this regard, we have been advised that the Australian Government will be announcing a \$280 million Black Summer Bushfires Grants programme in the next few weeks. With regard to the insurance claim related to the building collapse, your committee has completed compilation of all the insurers requests for information and we are hopeful of completion of a negotiated settlement of our claim in the next few months.

When is the Council Election?

Local Government elections in NSW were due to be held on Saturday 4 September but due to COVID19 issues the State Government announced on 24 July that the elections were being postponed to Saturday 4 December.

However this raised the question of what would happen in the Wingecarribee Shire as the Interim Administrator's term was meant to finish at the September election. After an initial announcement from the Dept of Local Government indicating that councillors who continue to hold their civic offices would resume their offices from 4 September to 4 December, this advice was revised by the Minister for Local Government (supported by local State members) pending further review of the legal options.

At the Council meeting on 28 July, the Interim Administrator, Viv May, gave notice of his intention to recommend in his final report in August that the Minister consider a public inquiry into Wingecarribee Council under s438u of the Act. It is understood that if the Minister proceeds with this enquiry, our local election would be postponed for a further 12 months. Watch this space....

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

Latest Advice from Robertson RFS Brigade

Notify before you burn

August and September are popular months to clean up around your yard before the fire season starts on 1 October. Stay safe and avoid unnecessary emergency calls by following some simple steps. You might avoid a hefty fine too.

Here are a few things to think about before you burn:

- Check which properties are able to burn and the steps to follow before burning <u>www.wsc.nsw.gov.au/</u> <u>Environment/Pollution-Information/Backyard-Burning</u>
- Notify the RFS of your planned burn, at least 24 hours before you light up. Use the QR code or go to www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify
- 3. Check if a total fire ban is in place before you burn conditions can change rapidly
- 4. Be neighbourly notify your neighbours at least 24 hours before you plan to burn.

Stay safe on winter roads

The daffodils are out and you might feel a spring in your step but winter isn't quite over yet.

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Every year the Robertson RFS brigade gets called to assist at motor vehicle accidents. We're always happy to help the community, but we'd rather you stayed safe on the roads. Driving on wet and icy roads needs a little additional care.

Motorists should be mindful of black ice and take care behind the wheel when faced with heavy rain, sleet or snow. Frost can cause ice to form on our roads. Add some light rain and you've got a slippery ride.

- Clear ice and frost off your windscreen and mirrors before you set off to make sure you can see clearly.
- Never drive on flooded roads.
- Look out for each other Make sure to take extra care with ice and snow on the road, always have vehicle fog or head lights on when vision is difficult and braking should be gentle and early.
- Check the Live Traffic NSW website for live updates.

In an emergency always call 000 (triple zero).

It's Census Time!

Australia's national census is being held on 10 August. The Census is a snapshot of who we are and tells the story of how we are changing. Census data is used to inform important decisions about transport, schools, health care, infrastructure and business. It also helps plan local services for individuals, families and communities. The Australian Bureau of Statistics advises that the 2021 Census has a number of new features.

Flexibility: For the first time in Australia's Census history, there will be a window of time to complete the Census, rather than a single night, so you can fill in your form at a time that best suits you.

New topics: There will be new questions in the 2021 Census, the first significant changes to questions collected in the Census since 2006. The new questions are on long-term health conditions, such as arthritis and diabetes, and on defence force participation.

Variety of completion options: You will be able to complete your Census online, on your mobile device, on paper, or with help from Census staff.

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Loneliness—the last taboo

We talk about everything else: death, sex and money. What do you think about loneliness?

Do you feel lonely? From time to time? Mostly? Rarely? Is it getting better or worse? What can you/we do about it?

There is robust evidence that social isolation and loneliness significantly increase risk for premature mortality. Many nations around the world would suggest we are facing a 'loneliness epidemic' so what can be done about it?

Loneliness is the gap between the amount of contact people have and how much contact they want. It is there amongst married people and single people where there are insufficient mutual relationships. It is greatest among people at both ends of life. Among young people 15 to 25 and those older than 75.

Both lonely groups believe people get impatient with them. Both feel that people don't care about them or value or respect them.

Ok, so what can be done about it? Quite a lot on a personal level, with relatives and friends and at the community level and at Robertson.

Individually we can recognise loneliness is not unusual. We can bust the stigma around admitting loneliness. We can recognize there is nothing wrong with the lonely person. But that can be hard to see when everyone is on their phones closed off.

In Robertson transport, just getting to places, is an issue which isolates older people. Whether it is lack of proper footpaths, public transport, illness or access to volunteer drivers, transport is not easy.

The Men's and Women's Shed is a wonderful amenity for people to join one another to talk, to make things or just to be. And it is at the centre of town.

Individually we can ask ourselves what we tell ourselves inside our heads about being alone and wanting more contact with other people. There is a choice between telling ourselves we are victims of isolation or telling ourselves that we can do things to contact other people.

When the candidates for election to the Wingecarribee Council show up ask them what they understand about loneliness and what are their values and plans for combatting isolation.

The CTC offers help for people to navigate

computers and online matters. Join or form a group which meets for coffee (there are nine places for coffee, I think).

The Jigsaw group of associations and groups around Robertson which is being formed can do a lot to notice isolated people and to offer a welcome to those who want to join groups or volunteer or knit together.

But probably the simplest, the easiest and most common day to day thing is just saying "Good day" to people we see. That can be expanded into a longer sentence or a chat or not, as feels comfortable.

One stand out lack in Robertson is some advocacy service for older, younger, less included people and others to help people find out how to access health, community services, transport and other service agencies. Not just bland brief curt instructions but genuine assistance to work to get people what they need and are entitled to by law and charity. Even something as simple as a once a week help, like the JP service offers, by someone who understands their way around the bureaucracy and can argue for the person in need.

Jodi Rogers, the dating coach on the TV program, Love on the Spectrum, says when she goes to the supermarket she chooses the most isolated person and asks them for help finding things. She is never rejected and mostly warmly welcomed.

We are currently looking to recruit Digital Mentors in the Be Connected Program. Mentors will join our current volunteer team and assist learners in small groups with increasing their digital skills, confidence and knowledge. Digital Mentors will need to complete a Volunteer Application form with the CTC, sign on via the Be Connected website and successfully undergo a Criminal Records Check. In another positive move, Destination NSW are now officially supporting the event along with Destination Southern Highlands, giving the overall event a higher profile and now more time to build awareness. Through their support the admission charge has been cut by 33% to just \$10 for adults and children under 16 are FREE!

The event content includes Live Arenas where exhibitors can demonstrate equipment to visitors so they get to see it in action and ask questions on the spot to assist their understanding of various product's capabilities and therefore making better purchase decisions. Other areas such as Talk Spots include advice on topics such as sustainability as well as specific farming management insights.

Fitz-Roy added "It's been a number of years since the Highlands had a dedicated Farms Expo and off the back of the last two years local agricultural shows not running, we anticipate AgriShow will be a fulfilling source to meet the pent-up demand.
