EVs and Solar Energy in Robertson

Every week at AgriWest, Pete stacks four bales of straw and hay into the back of my aging hatchback Corolla and every week I say, "I'm going to get a farm car soon, promise." The truth is I promised myself that I wouldn't get a new car until an EV was available and now that I've become a goat herder, that means an EV ute.



Unfortunately for my farm-cred, I'll be waiting at least another year for an Australian release of the futuristic EV pickup trucks manufactured by Tesla and Rivian or an EV version of one of the

classics – Toyota Hi-Lux, Ford Ranger, VW Amarok – currently in the design pipeline. There even may be an option closer to home with Australian company Nexport's proposal for a Moss Vale factory assembling EV utes by Chinese carmaker BYD.

In the meantime, there are two Teslas in the car park at Moonacres and I'm meeting Donna who owns the one without ELON on the numberplate. A newish local, Donna runs her life on solar energy and wants to show me her set up. Driving to her place, I'm mesmerised by the matte wood finish on the dash, the smart screen control and silent ride. "It's awesome on the road," she says. "Fast and responsive. But I'm more in love with the cruise control and navigation."

With Tesla's aim to make the Model 3 "affordable" and a NSW government-sponsored saving of about \$5,500 (covering rebate and stamp duty), Donna was ready to buy her dream car. "Imagine no fuel or service costs and even the brake pads don't wear out because of the regenerative braking technology!"

Energy from solar panels on the roof is stored in a wall battery in her garage, fuelling the house and car through an inverter (DC to AC) and fast wall EV charger. "The battery isn't a necessity," Donna says. "But it means the house and car have become "a virtual power plant, 100% charged from the sky", unaffected by blackouts. She has stayed on the grid for back up and sell back, and expects to recoup the

battery cost in about ten years. Clearly, an EV evangelist, Donna is happy to share her experience and can be contacted via the CTC.

At Pecora Dairy Cheese Shop, I'm there to buy a wedge of Yarrawa and end up talking virtual power grids. Michael Cains' face lights up with enthusiasm as he explains that solar energy generated at their farm near Knights Hill will soon help power their new bar in town. "We are setting up a peer to peer (P2P) network, where renewable energy is shared between sites. So when we have excess energy at the farm, we will send it up to the Cheese and Wine Bar and this network will also extend to four other agricultural businesses, so if one of us is low we can use energy from a peer and vice versa."

Pecora Dairy Farm is protected from blackouts because Michael manages the batteries according to the weather forecast, ensuring that they have power in reserve. "Assume there will be wild weather tomorrow, that changes what I do. Instead of using the batteries overnight, I'll keep batteries at 100% and use grid power instead. We can change the rules when we want and we can do it from our phones! Being on the grid is critical to our management of energy flow."

Phil Lavers from Moonacres was inspired by Michael's structure and decided the time was right to go solar. "I've been following the solar market since 2001 and listened to a friend who is involved. He told me to keep waiting and even 5 years ago he said keep waiting but this year he told me not to

Moonacres start drilling holes for their field-mounted array of panels this week and along with roof panels and zinc-bromide batteries, they will be solar powered before Christmas. "The payback time is about 17 years because we have 80 kilowatt batteries but most people won't have the same need. We can't afford not to have power for refrigeration and irrigation. There have been eight blackouts in Wilde's Meadow this year and some have lasted longer than a day. That is a serious problem for a farm business. If I can't irrigate 30,000 seedlings when I need to, then those 30,000 seedlings will end up in the compost. Reliability is key!"

When sunshine is abundant, Phil hopes the farm will send energy to the café in town too. "It is exciting," he says. "One of the things I've learnt is that big problems are solved in small parts – so even our 82 Kilowatts not pumping into the sky from burning coal, is saving those emissions. Ideally in the future, we would use the sun as a source of power for an electric tractor and mowers too."

Jamberoo Mountain Farm was off-grid when Nicole and Lachlan Feggins bought it nine years ago, but they have since upgraded the system, allowing them to grow their family-run business of ethically and sustainably raised eggs and beef while following their passion for regenerating the land. "Today, all critical farm infrastructure, including electric fencing, water pumps, feed silo and the house is fully powered by off-grid solar power system," Lachlan says.

Each chicken caravan in their lush paddocks has its own solar panel with all the components electrified. "The newest caravan is the best. It is fully automated so the doors open and close, the nesting boxes open and close. Automation is an important step in terms of efficiency. Doing things a better way, means better produce and we get better lay rates which makes the business more viable."

While Robertson's entrepreneurial regenerative farmers embrace the solar future as a financial imperative, there are opportunities for other local

businesses. Calling for an "EV Revolution", the NSW Government is rolling out an ultra-fast EV charging network across the state and has put out a call for "site hosts" for public EV charging stations. For interested landowners or leaseholders, look at www.energysaver.nsw.gov.au/EVcharginghosts.

Have You Heard of Mental Health First Aid?

I trained as a nurse after I left school and of course did the regular First Aid course for physical trauma at the start of my training, and have kept up with it, so that if necessary, I could render assistance to someone in need. After all, you'd hate to be helpless if someone you are about needs urgent help.

I have to admit, I hadn't heard of Mental Health First Aid, until recently when I started working for a Human Resources consultancy. Then I heard a staggering statistic, that 1 in 5 Australians (aged 16 -85) experience a mental illness in any year! It's concerning to say the least. This means that it is very likely that you know a few people who are suffering, and if you knew what to look out for you might be able to help!

After moving to Robbo recently I visited the CTC, because one of my main reasons for the 'tree change' was my desire to experience a greater sense of community than I felt previously in Sydney. Fortunately one of their programs really interested me so I signed up for the Mental Health First Aid course that the CTC had received a grant to host. Thirteen local participants took part on two consecutive Sundays. It was great to meet the other participants and also to share honest, frank and open discussion about subjects that most people find quite difficult to approach. The point is to raise awareness about, and destigmatise, 'mental illness'.

It was fascinating to learn that various forms of mental illness (anxiety, mild, moderate and severe depression, bipolar, substance abuse disorders et al) can be just as debilitating as physical illnesses, for example the disability caused by moderate depression is similar to the impact from relapsing multiple sclerosis, severe asthma or chronic hepatitis B.

The main thrust of what we learned was that we need to be more vigilant of those around us to notice behaviours and symptoms that might indicate that the person is in need of help. Early intervention works well to prevent problems from worsening and enable the person to recover quicker. Often, when you're really stressed its hard to think rationally, so it's possible for a Mental Health first aider to make a huge difference to someone going through a crisis by being there for them and in that way perhaps preventing further decline.

We were given a highly useful acronym to remember how to help. This action plan is **ALGEE**. Firstly, **A**pproach the person to assess and assist with any crisis. Most important is step 2, Listen. Listening and communication needs to be non-judgmental and fully centred on the person because it's not about you – it's about that vulnerable person. The third step is **G**ive support and information. The MHFA handbook sets out all the resources, useful information and help-lines available for the whole range of crises. It's not up to the first aider to diagnose. Sometimes people just need some guidance as to where they can go to get the help they need. The fourth step is **E**ncourage the person to get the appropriate professional help. The fifth step is **E**ncourage the person to seek other supports that may be available.

We learned about how to speak to a suicidal person, and how to deal with someone going through a psychotic episode. We had frank discussions, and role play scenarios, to help us to understand the things we learned about. I think I speak for all the participants in saying that now we are aware of the simple process, we feel confident that we will be able to identify and effectively assist people in need. The way I look at it, I would hope that if someone I care about needed assistance, it's more likely they'll receive the help they need if more people are aware that the Mental Health First Aid course is available. You can visit The MHFA Australia Team website: mhfa.com.au for more information. I would encourage more people to do this training, as an opportunity to help others in a very much needed way, given the obvious stresses that the recent pandemic has wrought on us. If it was one in five with mental health concerns pre-Covid, I wonder what it is now?

New Committee Members Urgently Needed for Robertson School of Arts

The Robertson School of Arts Committee are a hard working group dedicated to the maintenance of the School of Arts building in good repair and upgrading equipment as needed in order to have this important community facility available into the future.

Thanks to a successful application to the NSW Crown Lands Department, the Committee recently completed a number of projects including rebuilding the hall stage, sealing the driveway and moving the electricity box to the outside wall.

The Committee should be congratulated for managing to achieve \$772,366 in grants since 2016 for work including a new amenities block, new fencing and painting the building. The organisation contributed \$97,043 of its own funds to these projects which means a total of \$869,409 has been spent on this wonderful historic building.

The Robertson School of Arts does not receive any other financial help other than through fundraising such as markets, dances, private functions etc The Hall must pay for its own insurance and Council rates which takes a large amount of its funds. In its present form the Hall is in very good condition but there will always be maintenance to be taken care of.

considerable economic benefits to the local region.







The new extractor is housed outside in its own shed enclosure.

Next - we have been busy starting construction of



our new workbenches. We have purchased the timber and vices and the men and women are both getting into the construction of the new benches.



Next—We have been working with Ange Clarke from Where There's a Will, charity for people with disabilities. James McMaster one of our members has produced a model of the New York city Hudson steam locomotive and placed it on a cricket bat. Robertson Rural Fire Brigade would like to thank John Johnston for his 61 years of service and especially for the years of service to the Robertson community. We wish him well in his retirement.

Wherever you are this summer, please take note of the conditions and stay prepared. Live bush fire ready. Knowing how to get the most accurate information in case of emergency is vital. Download the Fires Near Me app and set up your watch zones to receive alerts. ABC Radio, RFS website www.rfs.nsw.gov.au, Live Traffic and even the Bureau of Meteorology website can provide useful information to help you plan ahead for your fire risk and which way to go if you are evacuating.

For some fires, you may hear a warning message over your radio or television, such as a siren or you may receive an Emergency Alert text message or phone call. Other fires may start so guickly that there will be no time for warning at all.

As part of a new Australian Warning System the icons used for Bush Fire Alerts have changed.



Advice A Fire has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes

Watch and Act There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family



Emergency Warning An Emergency Warning is the highest level of Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk

Stay safe, look out for each other and enjoy a wonderful summer.
