Vale Doug Pritchard

1 Dec 1944—4 Nov 2023

It was with great sadness that the news was received that Doug Pritchard had passed away in early November.



Doug Pritchard was an exceptional man. He cared so deeply for his community that he was seen as a staple of Robertson in the end. When asked to summarise a persons life in just a few paragraphs, you are faced with the monumental task of trying to quantify the entire story of a man who was profoundly different from most.

Doug Pritchard had lived a life few could have imagined. Thrilling journeys to exotic

locations to do high finance in some of the most beautiful cities in the world. Helicopter rides over the Hunter Valley to have lunch by a mountain side. Working tirelessly for every client that stepped through his elevator on the tower that was 222 Clarence street, Sydney. He used to boast about his famous clients all the time. He was such a proud man. He was always trying to get the best for people. His greatest success, he would say, would be getting the most back for each of his clients. These clients would more often than not become life long friends.

Doug was born on 1 December 1944 in Melbourne to Morris Pritchard and Pamela Dedman. He grew up with his older brother William or Bill as he was known. Doug attended Camberwell Grammar for Boys in Melbourne's east. He was a very creative student and loved the arts and music. He was a talented sketch artist using mostly graphite pencils. Doug was very musical and sang in his school choir. He also played the drums. He joined the local choir and also sang with the University of Sydney Graduate Choir, which was a very proud accomplishment for him. Doug Pritchard really carved out a great amount of success for himself and others when he eventually took up office in Sydney city. Commanding a space in 222 Clarence street, Sydney city, CBD. This was where Doug would hone his accounting and financial practice skills to a fine point. He retired shortly before his 70th birthday.

When Doug moved to Robertson, his life changed quickly. He found himself within this community in Robertson and wanted to give everything he could to this little town. Robertson soon became his sanctuary. His garden flourished, his financial practice business was soon taking off and his daughter Camilla moved soon afterwards to be closer to her father. Doug opened up "office" in Moonacres and became a happy fixture of Robertson, with many clients just showing up to his house with a bottle in hand and a question. Doug was always happy to oblige.

Doug was the treasurer of the CTC for many years, enjoying the thrilling highs and lows of the position. He would often quip fondly about the good work he was doing and how he felt he was really making a difference for people. He helped launch several successful family businesses in town who would become his best clients and friends.

In 2020 his daughter Camilla finally convinced him to get the very best care that money could buy. So, it wasn't long before he had comfortably settled in to his new residence at the Abbey, in Mittagong. It was here he said he was "so happy he could fly". In the month of October, Doug was diagnosed with an incurable autoimmune disease. He was told he only had days to live and yet he held on for 6 weeks. His strength and resilience was second to none. He died in the arms of his daughter, Camilla, as she had taken up a bedside vigil and promised that he would not "die alone". This promise she fulfilled as he passed away at 2:30pm on November the 4th. He was peaceful and content, he died with no regrets.

He never forgot his time in Robertson, still a very loved member of the community. He was buried in Robertson cemetery on the 15th of November, 2023. It is here he rests in peaceful bliss as he is now enjoying his "eternal resting place" with a view "to die for".

Discussion following the election centred on how our group can achieve its object of considering how Robertson can improve its sustainability as a vital village using the 8 Domains of Liveability in an Age-Friendly Community set out by the World Health Organisation as a guide. Waiting for Council to invest in renovation and capital improvements as outlined in the Robertson Place Plan may not be the only solution. Perhaps there are actions both large and small that we could take on ourselves to build pride in Robertson and enhance its liveability.

A Redwood Forest in Robertson? Who Knew?

Robertson is the custodian of critically endangered Yarrawa rainforest, but you might be surprised to know that Robertson also has another dem – a rare forest of Redwoods (Sequoia sempervirons). The history of this forest has faded over the years but fortunately was recorded by the late Denis Wilson in one of his prolific blogs from which some of the information below is derived.

As we all know,

Between the eastern end of South Road opposite the Robertson Nature reserve is five acres

of Crown land extending north to the railway line. This area was first established with radiata pines by the Robertson Primary School Forest Trust in 1987 and was known as the Robertson Bicentenary Forest. The trees were harvested and provided \$25,000 for the school.

Robertson resident, Laurence Langley, was the honorary secretary of the Trust and a dedicated environmentalist. He researched the possibility of establishing a grove of Californian redwoods on the site, an idea suggested by the late Jocelyn Squire. He knew that the climate with high rainfall and rich, acid red soil would be ideal and he imported seed from New Zealand, where the trees had previously been successfully established, and raised them for planting.

Laurence died in 2007 but the forest slowly grew largely unnoticed and became infested with weeds along South Street. In 2008 REPS held a working bee to remove the numerous Privet and Scottish



Broom bushes and erected a new sign acknowledging the area as the Laurence Langley Memorial Redwood Grove.

Over the years the weeds returned and the deteriorated sign was found on the ground. The

Council has undertaken some remedial work and some in the community together with the Council and REPS are getting together with a view to ensuring the forest remains vibrant. These giants can grow to 115 metres tall and can store up to three times as much carbon as other type of forest and so far have only reached half of their potential size.

Take a walk through the grove, experience the silence and be awed by their presence.


