Robertson Village "Jigsaw" Meeting

The invitation read, Invitation to a community meeting. Where does your group fit into the Robertson Village jigsaw?' So on Wednesday May 12 the historic meeting took place. Historic, because this was the first get together for twenty or so groups and associations catering for people in Robertson.

The Robertson Futures Group invitation brought an enthusiastic response. About two dozen people got together at the CTC to 'ascertain from each group or association its particular concerns and what improvements can be made which might make its function easier for the group members...and member's views about how they see the future of Robertson,' So what happened?

Each group representative outlined what their group did, why they existed, and details about their history, members and their vision etc. Who was there? Who turned up? - Robertson Community Garden, CTC publishing and news, Fire Service, Bowling Club, Women's Shed, Men's Shed, Robertson Environmental Protection Society, Pool Association, Illawarra Walking Concept, Contemplative End of Life and Meditation Circle, The Op Shop, Table Tennis, Robertson Futures-Age Friendly Robertson, Heritage Railway and Waratah Garden, The Knitting Group, Crop Swap, CTC printing, cinema etc.

What was achieved?-There was a strong feeling of 'This is worthwhile and let's do it again'. There was no shortage of voiced or implied jobs for a future emerging community group. These included: groups helping other groups, advocacy for the Robertson community and for groups and underrepresented, or disadvantaged individuals, (people who do not own computers or could not understand them, those unable to read or write), help running events, enhancing inclusion and lessening isolation.




Specific projects like footpaths for the town and hosting a meeting for Wingecarribee Council candidates to speak to the electors in Robertson about their values and views of Robertson, conducting information sessions or discussions concerning developments in Robertson or on matters of community concern.

What is next? There will probably be more linking and cooperation between groups who attended. Questions Arising—Maybe some inquiry and reinviting of groups who did not make it on the night would be worthwhile. Inquiry about people who do not belong to any particular group or association in town. Then there is the matter of the formation of a Robertson Community Association. Who should be included? How should members be elected? How are they to be responsible and responsive to the community? How are differences of opinions managed? What kind of a mix of views, skills and experience does the group need?

'Well done!', to the Robertson Futures Group for taking the initiative to host the meeting. The challenge now is to build on the excellent start and keep everyone included.

Postcript—Mark Turner, Secretary of Robertson Futures Group, has advised that they are working on a proposed structure for a community association which will be put to a further meeting of group representatives for discussion in the near future. They also hope to add groups who missed out on the first meeting.

The Story Behind the Making of the New Rainforest Guide

The new REPS book, A Guide to the Robertson Rainforest: Trees, Shrubs, Vines and Ferns of the Yarrawa Brush, was launched at a formal function on Saturday May 15, 2021 in Robertson. The launch was followed by an exhibition of drawings, photographs, plant specimens and guided walks at the Robertson CTC (Community Technology Centre).

Feedback from those attending the launch has been very positive. Folk in the Robertson community have been awaiting this new book with great anticipation. The first edition, published in 1993 has been widely used for nearly thirty years. At the launch, I was able to give a brief overview of the book, but here I would like to share the backstory of how it was made, and also thank some of the people behind the scenes who made it happen.

The making of such a book presented challenges for all of us on the committee. Some members had been involved with the first book and brought their valuable experience to this project. The main difference this time, however, was the extent to which technology has changed since the early 1990's. Now everything must be digitised.


We were all quite familiar with preparing the 'raw materials' of the book i.e. the written text, photos and

drawings. What was new was the process of getting that all into a digital file suitable to send to the printer.

There was a lot of deliberation about how the book would 'look and feel' and what the experience of the book would be like for users. Once we agreed that it was for a wide audience, this guided our decisions about the content, layout and design. A big thank you must go to Lucinda Mitchell, from the Tangello Group. Without her design and production work the book would never have been completed. She gave excellent guidance on how the book would look best – the cover design, colour coded page edges, design of each page and much more.

She explained how to set out the sections and their order. Then we decided the contents of each page. Once each plant was allocated its own page number, that could not be altered without impacting on all the other pages. For people used to working in this way, none of this will surprise you, but for most of us, used to working with the flexibility of word processing, it was a big challenge.

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Every photograph had to be edited, then given a file name with the page number and plant name so that the photo could be placed on the correct page. Quite a tricky job, most ably managed by Sheila McInnes, who spent many hours on this task.

The number of words in the text was strictly limited and we sometimes had to reduce the amount of text

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to keep within the page limit. There were four stages of text editing and proofing. Thank you to Steve Douglas for his peer review, Arwen Apps for her professional editing and Jenny Simons and Jane Pye from the Southern Highlands Australian Plant Society for proofing the text.

Ian Perkins from Wingecarribee Shire Council generously

assisted with the maps. He worked with Allan Stiles who has been closely mapping the rainforest remnants for many years and produced the maps in the first edition.

The drawings were all done from live specimens, collected for me by REPS members. I discussed each drawing with Kevin Mills and corrected it where necessary. I must thank Kevin for his patience when giving me advice on the drawings. They were all A3 size pen and ink studies of the required species, twenty of which are currently on exhibition at the Robertson CTC.

All drawings were then scanned into digital format. We selected parts of each drawing for the Keys pages and parts for the Guide pages. Zara Dawkins, from Tangello, deserves thanks for her beautiful work in cropping and editing the drawings and for positioning them to give the effect you can see in

the final book. Readers may not notice the way in which the right side of the text follows the shape of the drawing so that the two elements relate visually to each other. Have a look at your Guide pages and

you will see this. I've provided two pages as examples.

While I was the project coordinator, and my work has been kindly acknowledged by many people, making the book was a tremendous team effort. Congratulations to the many people who made it possible. I look forward to the book being used by this community for years to come.

Saturday, 24 April 2021 was a warm and sunny day for the resumption of *'The Cockatoo Run'* heritage passenger train from Sydney to Robertson and Moss Vale. This was after a delay of many months due to Covid-19 restrictions, the last train being in

February 2020. The recent train conveyed more than 200 passengers to from the Southern Highlands. As a welcome and novel touch, the train was welcomed into Robertson station by Cameron Wood (on bagpipe) and brother Toby (snare drum). The boys are hoping to do this on a regular basis,

the next Cockatoo Run train being scheduled for Sunday, 6 June 2021.

A contrasting day weather-wise was on Saturday, 15 May, when cold and windy conditions were experienced for the "official opening" of the Robertson Heritage Railway Station's recently installed Information Signs. Designed by Peter Campbell from Moss Vale, these robust, informative structures attempt to explain and answer many of the questions relating to the history of the station, its construction and its heritage classification, in addition to other matters of railway operation on the important Unanderra-Moss Vale railway line. The signs contain descriptive writing, diagrams, maps and photographs. An item on one of these three signs pays tribute to the vision, drive and initiative of the early founders

of RHRS, particularly David and Helen Tranter, who established the waratah gardens on the site and welcomed passengers on the train to Robertson village. The early founders, all volunteers, set a fine example.

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No Such Thing as a Free Lunch?

In fact, just a moment ago, I viewed it again - they can thank me later. But very soon, due to this sale, that famed video of little Charlie biting his brother's finger will be private property and unable to be seen on the world wide web... or at least not YouTube. If you want to watch it again, you'll need to pay for it. Apparently, all this is part of a growing trend of popular YouTube videos being sold off as non-fungible tokens*... I have no idea what they are! But what I do understand is that what was once free, now costs.

I guess that's the reality of many things in life, or as the saying "there's no such thing as a free lunch!" Getting something for free is rare these days.

However, the Bible tells us that God's love for you and I is exactly that. Free. No strings attached. In fact, you can't earn it or pay for it. * Nerd Talk—What is a nonfungible token?

Editor's Note—Okay, I was intrigued to find out more and found this explanation at <u>nerdschalk.com/what</u>-does-non-fungible-mean/

"To understand what makes a thing *non-fungible*, it's good to understand what the root word 'fungible' means. Fungibility refers to the interchangeability of an asset. Anything fungible is replaceable with something that is of an equal value. For simplicity, associate fungible with replaceable (or interchangeable). A basic example of something fungible is money. A \$10 note is fungible as it can easily be replaced with ten \$1 coins (or other denominations of equal value).

Now, anything that cannot be so easily replaced is nonfungible. Real world objects that cannot be replaced with other items are nonfungible. Your old telecaster guitar, an autographed book, baseball cards, or other such collectibles are said to be nonfungible. Even your collection of coins that are no longer in circulation are nonfungible. Basically, nonfungible is just a high-brow word for something that is unique and thereby defies easy interchangeability...

For purposes of identity management, non-fungible tokens or NFTs (or niftys) are excellent. Just like a physical passport that you need to produce at the point of entry and exit, digital things can be given a unique identity as well. "

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
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Help Plan the Local Youth Forum
