ROBERTSON RAILWAY PROJECT ON TRACK

After some delays the Robertson Railway project is starting to work up a full head of steam. Since the inception of this idea for Community management of the Robertson Railway site back in December 1998, the bureaucratic wheels have twisted and turned. The fact is that now however, Rail Estate have agreed to extend a lease of the site to Wingecarribee Shire Council.

Subject to a satisfactory assessment of the Robertson Railway Station, Council have resolved to enter into a licence agreement for the premises with State Rail.

I have recently been informed that some local young people have expressed an interest in assisting with the Railway project through becoming a part of an "earning a living" scheme. They are extremely keen to commence work on the site, as I am sure are the rest of our community. There is no doubt in my mind that this project will have very significant advantages for residents and visitors to our village.

Once approval is given for the community management of the Station, work can begin. At this stage I hope that a partnership between the Robertson Environment Protection Society (REPS) and the Robertson Business Association (RBA) can be formed and that together we can organise some local volunteers to act in a supervisory role for the project. All being well it is anticipated (bureaucratic process permitting) that commencement will be early in the new year.

There may be an opportunity to make applications to Rail Estate for some funding for the project, given that the Station building itself is of high conservation value. During the life of the project there will be a number of opportunities for public involvement, and sponsorship. It is envisaged that this area will become a central focus for the village and provide a venue for local businesses to display Arts, Crafts and Services to the public. It may also be an appropriate site to provide tourist information. It is anticipated that the site will provide some shelter for tourists and become a recreation area. It will also benefit the commuters of the Cockatoo Run and present a warmer welcome to those who arrive by train as visitors to our beautiful village.

The first step after approval will of course be the preparation of a concept plan and a meeting with the local community. I don't know about you, but I can't wait. It looks as though it's shaping up to be a good start to the new millennium for the little village of Robertson.

A perfect example of this is the tremendous fund raising carried out by the Robertson Support Group for Children With Special Needs. Until a few days ago your reporter had never even heard of them but, in fact, this small and enterprising group of local ladies have been beavering away in their own free time since 1994. Furthermore, in the relatively short space of five years, the group has raised over \$8,000 for the benefit of sick children with special needs in Robertson and the surrounding area and for the benefit, also, of their parents and other family members.

Furthermore, in addition to the principal objective of taking care of local needs, funds have also been distributed in several other ways. Some of the major beneficiaries have been the Westmead and the Randwick Childrens' Hospitals. Substantial sums have been donated to the King George 5th Hospital to provide beds for tiny babies with jaundice. Similar sums have been given to the John Spencer Neo-Natal Ward, together with significant donations towards the maintenance of Ronald McDonald House; the excellent temporary residence and haven of rest for so many parents, exhausted by the stress and anxiety of caring for extremely sick children and those suffering from terminal illnesses.

So who are these wonder-women of Robertson who are making all of these amazing things happen? In fact, they're people like Hope Waters, Melissa Lovell, Jean Tobler, Pat Willard and many others. They don't act like wonder-women and they're certainly not interested in being in the limelight. But they most definitely are interested in continuing to raise funds for the benefit of the children who are so close to their hearts.

How can we help them? Well, this is where the chocolate bars come into the story. These dynamic ladies have just ordered twenty big boxes of charity chocolate which they'll soon be selling throughout the village as part of their next major fundraising drive. So dig deep and make sure that you buy as much as possible when you get the chance.

Both the brothers began training in early November for the new season scheduled to begin in February. I'm sure that we all proudly wish them every success for many seasons to come. 

Hampden Park Management Committee

This 355 Committee was formed 2 years ago by Wingecarribee Council to administer our parkland in Robertson. This includes the playing fields, Caalong Creek Reserve (on the Northern side of the creek) & the Lions Park. Each sporting body using the park, Hockey, Cricket & Soccer, has a representative as well as Lions Club, Scouts, R.E.P.S, Village Association and now the Robertson Business Association.

This small group has been trying to upgrade our park area and so far has finished the amenities block, put in trees on the northern boundary, re-seeded the top playing fields and installed two new picnic tables with extra seating (with a shelter to be installed over the new tables by Christmas).

We have our own resident maintenance man who has volunteered to keep the grass down in the picnic areas and Caalong Reserve so that picnicers can use these areas in comfort.

Future plans include a walking path around the edge of the Park, move and improve Cricket nets, a large shelter, better BBQ facilities in Lions Park and more shelters and tables scattered around the park area. Centenary of Federation

Do you know that on 9 July 1900 Queen Victoria signed the Royal Commission of Assent to the Australian Constitution, marking the Royal approval for the Constitution. So next year is the actual centenary.

To mark the occasion in Wingecarribee Shire, a Committee was formed last year, calling for community projects to apply for a Federation Grant to celebrate the occasion. Three were successful: tree planting linking Mittagong Bowral and Moss Vale; Berrima District & Family Historical Society's Museum project; and the Bundanoon Community Development Association's upgrading of the Memorial Hall.

It was pointed out to the Committee that the people of the villages in the Shire would also wish to be part of the celebrations as well as the three towns.

To that end there will be a small amount allocated to each area (maybe \$1,000.00) to buy trees, either tube stock or advanced trees, prepare the ground, buy tree guards, look after them etc., maybe they could be planted at the entrances to the villages or in a grove or park or?

And this is where you come in! Perhaps organisations or families may wish to purchase one or more, perhaps as a memorial to someone or just for the pure love of enhancing the area in which we love to live; so please think about it. The plantings will commence on the actual anniversary day (9 July 2000) and continue for approximately two months.

The Committee is aiming to get in touch with all organisations, churches, schools etc. for ideas and help later on, and with the assistance of co-opted Council staff, will be checking with nurseries re suitable trees for each area.

Please give this some thought. It would be wonderful to have a big village day out, wouldn't it? There will be updates in this newsletter during the year.

PREPARING YOUR GARDEN FOR SUMMER.

Have you noticed how even after all the rain we have had in the last month some of our gardens have dried out already? Robertson is blessed with deep soils and one of the highest rainfalls in the country but keeping moisture in our garden beds is still a challenge.

The answer is of course organic matter. It does not really matter what you use, as long as it was once alive. Any kind of manure, homemade compost, mulching straw or leaf litter will improve the water holding capacity of your soil. It will keep moisture in the top layers of the garden where most of our plants need it and help keep the soils cooler during the hot months to come.

As your mulch or manures slowly break down they will be feeding your soil and building up the worm and helpful insect populations as well. A well mulched soil will reduce any stress your plants might be feeling in the heat of summer and of course it will greatly reduce your water bill by almost eliminating the need to water.

A few things to remember when mulching your garden don't let the mulch come into contact with the trunks of trees or shrubs as this can lead to rotting on the stems. If you are using fresh chook manure, compost it or mix it with straw and let it have time to age before placing it on your beds. If you choose to use pine bark or chips always sprinkle a layer of fertiliser over the soil first as the chips

actually take out nutrients as they break

down.

By mulching now before the summer sun hits you will keep the garden looking fresh, green and beautiful - save dollars off your water bill and reduce weeds as well.



ROBERTSON LINK TO SNOWY MOUNTAINS SCHEME: "LEMMONS ROAD".

To the inhabitants of the drought-plagued interior, the irrigation potential of the snow-fed rivers of the Alps was clear. As for its hydro-electric potential, studies dated back to 1908. But it took a conjunction of events in the post-war years to see the Snowy scheme established.

In 1946 a resident Norwegian engineer persuaded some trout fishing friends to measure river levels. With that data, Trygue Olsen proved that by turning the rivers backwards through tunnels under the mountains much greater quantities of hydroelectric power could be produced than had previously been considered.

Nelson Lemmon, Minister for Works and Housing in the Chifley Government was impressed. He saw the scheme as liberating Australians from the constant blackouts they then suffered, as well as providing an inland food-bowl. He manoeuvred the Snowy Scheme into being just two months before Labor lost to the Liberals in 1949. He also appointed William Hudson, a local engineer, as Commissioner.

Today when development advantages must be balanced against environmental sustainability, the consensus is the Snowy would not be built. Critics point out environmental damage; the irrigation water bringing life to the inland has also caused disastrous salinity. The Snowy River is nearly dead, cut to one per cent of its original flow. But the scheme provides renewable electricity for peak usage with minimal greenhouse effects. The environmental debate continues but few dispute the Snowy Scheme's contribution in the forging of the Australian nation.

Mr Nelson Lemmon moved to Robertson and established a thoroughbred horse stud. He later subdivided this land into smaller acreages which Lemmons Road services today.
