LOCAL ELECTIONS: LOCAL BOYS MAKE GOOD!

It is pleasing to find that two of our locals have won the day in such an overwhelmingly successful manner and will, therefore, be in a strong position to speak up loud and clear whenever issues directly affecting Robertson are raised in future Council meetings.

We refer, of course, to Larry Whipper and Paul Tuddenham; and we extend to each our very best wishes and support for the full and demanding roles for which they have both, so selflessly, volunteered their time and energy during the coming four years.

We were able to reach Larry by telephone soon after the results were declared and, after thanking us for our congratulations, he went on to say, " Above all, I want to say 'Thank you' from the bottom of my heart, to all of the people who have supported me and who have voted for me, especially those in Robertson but also throughout the Shire".

Larry added, "I'd like to emphasise to everybody that I'm always here and ready to help. There are many local issues which are of major concern to me, such as the Sheepwash Road intersection. But, of course, my overriding interests are in doing all that I can to ensure that the outstanding benefits of living and working in Robertson are shared and enjoyed by all residents. I firmly believe that this should ideally be achieved by aiming for ecological and economic sustainability combined with social justice. It is to these principles that I am committed on behalf of the community which I am so proud and happy to serve."

We had to wait until later in the day to reach Paul Tuddenham. When we did, he had only just arrived home in the evening after his tough and daily commute by car to and from business in Sydney. Almost certainly he had to have been a trifle travel weary when we spoke, but there was no hint of it in the pleasant, warm and friendly manner in which he came to the telephone.

Again after thanking us for our good wishes, Paul said how very grateful he was to the entire community for its tremendous support and how indebted he was to all of the many people who had voted in his favour. He said, "Of course, I've always had a very close affinity with Robertson and a deep interest in its affairs. I'm sure that this stems from the fact that , when I was in my early teens, I moved there to live and help on my father's farm, so I naturally built up a strong rapport with the village itself and with the surrounding area.

Obviously I'm committed to working for the benefit of all communities and I should like everybody to be assured that I'm approachable at all times. But I'm especially supportive of Robertson interests and activities, particularly the exciting initiative of the newly-formed Robertson Business Association together with its move towards inclusion within the Southern Highlands Business Chamber, of which I'm an enthusiastic and heavily involved member."

PETITIONS ON THE BLACK SPOT.


This junction seems to be a never-ending topic of conversation and concern among all sectors of the community and with so many of the different National and local authorities responsible for highway administration. All sorts of high profile politicians like Peta Seaton and Joanna Gash are taking a lively and active interest and, for this, we are extremely grateful. There seems to be much concern, considerable interest, innumerable reports and limitless statistics. In fact, there seems to be masses of just about everything that you can imagine except, in the final analysis, fast and positive action to resolve the problem.

Surely it does not require the mental powers and depths of wisdom of a modern day Socrates to spell out what needs to be done. And, for what it's worth, here's just one contribution for consideration:

All traffic on the Sheepwash Road must be made to stop at the junction. All traffic on the Illawarra Highway must be made to slow down to 60K when travelling through the junction. All drivers who fail to observe the rules face immediate loss of licence.

Draconian? Possibly. But something pretty dramatic needs to be done, and fast, to drive some sense and responsibility into the heads of the irresponsible few who have such callous disregard for the safety and wellbeing of the quiet, peaceful and law-abiding members of our community who, thankfully, represent the overwhelming majority.

So let's hope that the petition will make a significant contribution towards helping substantially to reduce the deadly menace of this highway blackspot which has been with us now for far too long. Arthur Jackson

Fruit Trees in Robertson.

Do you have a little bit of spare space in your garden ? Have you thought of growing a fruit tree?

Fruit trees can provide us with beautiful flowers, fruit and foliage. The white flowers of the fruiting plums and cherries the bright pink flowers of the peaches and the perfect blossom of the apples and pears can compete with their ornamental cousins any day.

Some types of fruit trees will need to be planted in pairs to allow for cross pollination. Two different varieties of the same fruit - for example a Granny Smith and a Delicious planted close by will ensure masses of apples on each tree. If space is a problem two trees can be planted in the same hole or neighbours can get together and plant one on either side of the fence.

Plums are very easy to grow and you can choose from the juicy Japanese blood plums or the firmer European plums. A plum tree should fruit within a couple of years of planting, providing enough fruit for jams, pies and eating straight from the tree after about four years.

Nashi pears are a fairly new fruit tree for the Australian backyard. They have large white flowers in spring followed by fruit which ripens in summer. Picked and eaten straight from the tree they taste like liquid sugar.

For a really stunning effect in a small area the new series of 'Ballerina' apple trees will provide a good crop of fruit on a small tree less than 40cm wide. These new trees look great as a feature or used in pots on a sunny verandah.

All fruit trees are heavy feeders and will respond well to regular applications of animal manures or chemical fertilisers. They need regular deep watering especially when the fruit is growing and ripening and do not like to have grass growing at their base.



No garden is too small to grow some fruit and just remember that if you don t get around to eating your crop at least you will have some very happy birds in your neck of the woods!

Nathan's Recipe of the Month

Apricot Topside

Cover ½ cup of dried apricots with water and soak 2 hours. Brown a large piece of lean topside (1-2 kilos), in a little butter in a large saucepan. Add 1 chopped onion, grated rind of ½ lemon, 1 cup of stock or water, salt and pepper, Simmer for 2 hours; add apricots and simmer further 1/2 hour. Remove meat and thicken liquid with a little flour. Serve with rice or boiled potatoes.

We attended a "Weeds Day" at berrima and were delighted to meet people from Landcare & The Department of Agriculture who were as concerned about weeds as we are. Since we came to Robertson five years ago we have noted with concern the spread of Oxeye Daisy in the area. This is a noxious weed in Victoria and although it has been noted in the Southern Highlands for many years it is now reaching plague proportions in the Belmore Falls Rd area and noteably the old rubbish tip in Yeola Rd.

It is already invading the bush areas and if left unchecked can become a major menace. All farmers know about "Fire Weed".

Fortunately the Department of Agriculture is taking a keen interest and looking at how best to attack the problem. The daisy will soon begin to bloom and when we have more information we hope to hold a meeting to do something to attack this problem.




Robertson Calendar 2000
